

Benefits for families with children at school

Now that the children are back at school, the Royal Borough of Greenwich wants to make sure that local families are claiming all the help available to them.

There is a range of education and social security benefits which families may be able to claim depending on their circumstances.

Education Benefits include:

- **Free school meals** – available for children in the following circumstances:

In infants (up to year 2) – from September 2014, all children in the infants (reception, year 1 and year 2) automatically get a free school meal. However, it's important to sign up for school meals as registering could mean extra government funding for your child's school.

In year 3 and above – whose parent(s), carer(s) or guardian(s) receive one of the following benefits: Income Support, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, income-related Employment and Support Allowance, Pension Credit Guarantee, Universal Credit, or Child Tax Credit (CTC) only and your annual income is £16,190 or less. You cannot get this help if you get or qualify for Working Tax Credit (WTC). However you can still qualify if you are getting the four-week WTC 'run-on' because you are no longer treated as being in full-time work.

Young people who are claiming one of the above benefits independently can also get free school meals

Working couples: *changes to the Working Tax Credit (WTC) rules for couples in 2012 meant that some families lost their WTC. If you were affected by these changes, remember to check if you can now get free school meals. It's also worth contacting Royal Greenwich's Welfare Rights team for a benefit check – there may be other benefits you are missing out on, such as Housing Benefit or Council Tax Support.*

- **School Clothing Grants** – you can get help towards the cost of school clothing if you live in the borough and get one of the benefits listed above or CTC (at a rate higher than the basic family element) or Working Tax Credit.

Grants are available when your child enters reception year or year 3 (£40), year 7 (£100) and year 9 (£70).

You may also be able to get help towards the cost of school trips and free school milk for your child.

If your child attends an Academy school, different arrangements apply for claiming free school meals and clothing grants – check with the school for details.

If your child is staying on at school or college after their GCSEs or is doing an approved training course, they may be able to get extra financial help. The 16 to 19 Bursary Fund helps young people facing financial hardship to stay in full or part-time education or unwaged training. Contact the school, college or training provider to claim or for more information. Alternatively go to the GOV.UK website – www.gov.uk and search for '16 to 19 bursary'.

Benefits and tax credits

There is a range of benefits and tax credits that families may be able to claim depending on their circumstances. For example, you may be able to get Child Tax Credit if you have dependent children under 20 – CTC is for both working and non-working families. There is also Working Tax Credit (WTC) if you are in low paid work for at least 16 hours a week. Most couples must work at least 24 hours a week between them to qualify for WTC (with one person working at least 16 hours). You may also be able to get help towards the cost of childcare while you work depending on your circumstances.

You may be able to claim help towards your rent and council tax depending on your circumstances. Contact Greenwich Advice and Benefits Service to claim on 020 8921 4900 (or 18001 020 8921 4900 for textphone users) or go to www.royalgreenwich.gov.uk to download a form.

If you have a child under age 16 with additional support needs – you may be able to get Disability Living Allowance (DLA) for them (or they

may get Personal Independence Payment (PIP) once they reach the age of 16). These benefits are paid on top of any other money or benefits you have coming in. Many families miss out on DLA and PIP and other linked benefits because they do not know they can claim. Ring the Welfare Rights Service helpline for more information – see below.

If you are starting work – it is important to get advice as many people miss out on extra help. Contact your local Jobcentre Plus office for details of what is currently available.
